Child Safety and the Metaverse

Christmas has now come to a close and a new year has begun. As pupils and staff return to school, the annual playground inquisition will begin. Among their peer group young people will begin to discuss what they got for Christmas. For many the answer will almost certainly be 'a Fortnite battle pass, a new PC, a PlayStation 5 etc'.

All devices which allow both unfettered access to the internet and expose children to voice chat, text chat and photo sharing with complete strangers. This year presents an acceleration of vulnerability window as, VR headsets, connected to Facebook's Metaverse have been released onto the marketplace. The Metaverse seeks to link users to the internet as a Virtual Entity through the use of Virtual Reality Headsets.

This amplifies the danger children are exposed to online. Over the coming months it will be vital for DSL's to understand these Christmas gifts and the issues linked to them. - The health and safety of all children;
- Making sure that the adults who work here have undergone safety and security checks;
- Protecting children from deliberate harm;
- Being an anti-bullying school;
- Being proactive against racist behaviour;
- Protecting our children from harassment and discrimination;
- A positive approach to behaviour management including the use of physical intervention safely, when necessary;
- Meeting the needs of children with medical conditions;
- Providing first aid;
- Children enjoying safe educational visits;
- Caring for children's personal needs;
- Keeping children safe when using the internet;
- Making sure our school is secure and safe;
- Listening to children

All of our staff at Barrs Court have regular safeguarding training updates. Safeguarding is also part of our induction programme for new staff.

The Safeguarding Team oversee and coordinate all aspects of the school's work to ensure that children are kept safe. They regularly attend training to ensure that skills and knowledge are up to date, and that they are able to then effectively train the school staff.

The school's new Safeguarding Policy is on the website and sets out in more detail the full range of areas that are covered. Many areas of school life overlap into safeguarding, and other school policies that support this are:

Anti-Bullying

Bullying is not acceptable in any form and this includes information about how the school deals with any incidents of bullying.

Attendance

The importance of attending school regularly and the impact that this will have on children's life chances

Behaviour Policy

A child's behaviour is often an indication when something is not right, or if something is worrying them

Safer Recruitment

The importance of making sure that all the adults that are employed in school are appropriate and are safe to work with children

Staff Code of Conduct

Clearly sets out our expectations about how staff keep themselves and the children safe

Health and Safety Policy

Ensuring that the site is kept safe at all times

Educational Visit Policy

Ensuring that when children are off-site, the same expectations about their safety apply

Online Safety Policy

In a world where so much is done online it is crucial that children know how to keep themselves safe online, and this policy is continually updated to reflect the current situation.
